A Phoenix company has the answer. It's Toyla Tab, "the samtary tooket-seat lifter."

Steward envisions a Valley full of Toyla Tabs, from portable toilets - "there are thousands of them" - to airfules.

"It's something we're going to look at It's very innovative," said Tony Hatcher, a procurement manager

The city probably would start with a few test sites.

"We're looking as the aisport," he said. "You have people going in and out of there constantly."

John Spearman is already a fair.

"I thick the Toyla Tab is a great product," sixt Spearman, assistant director for the Anaona Deparement of Corrections.

He has worked with Steward and Charles Sints, who invented the device several years ago, for more than a year. They may use inmate labor to make the Toyla Tabs.

Immates already work as telemarketers and make things from bicycle parts to novelty items through the Prison Industry Enhancement Programs.

Steward and Sims would get manufacturing space in the prison - and a built-in labor pool.

"We provide the opportunity for them to have a labor pool with fixed pay," Spormian said.

For the prison, it's a way to keep prisoners basy.

Spearman said the Toyla Tab operation could create work for about 50 immates.

While Phoenia is familiarizing itself with the product, the city already knows Steward.

The city sued him in 1994 for unpaid sales taxes when he was doing business as Steward Food Service Inc. The city's law department said the matter has not been resolved.

Steward agreed, but said, "This is Charles Suns'
