University Receives \$1 Million Gift to Benefit International Education

In honor of International Education Week, the Washburn Endowment Association and Washburn University are pleased to announce an estate gift, which will provide \$1 million in scholarship funds for international studies, from deceased alumni, Geneva Seybold, ba'21.

Seybold, who was born in 1900 and died in 2004, left a provision in her will to fund endowed scholarships at Washburn. The provision will provide more than \$1 million for important scholarships for students participating in the international studies programs. Seybold's legacy to Washburn will have a lasting effect for many years. Her gift makes it possible for her adventurous spirit to live on in the lives of many Washburn students. Chinese Scholar Visits Washburn

Professor Tianyu Cao of Boston University visited Washburn, November 9, 2006. During his short stay Professor Cao delivered two lectures to the public, "Modern and Postmodern Mappings Between Science and History" and "Modernization, Globalism, and the Chinese Path".

Professor Cao is a celebrated scholar in the areas of philosophy of science, philosophy of physics, history of science and methodology of historiography of science, epistemology, metaphysics, social and political philosophy. He earned his Ph.D. from the University of Cambridge and has been awarded many prestigious scholarships, fellowships, and grants by such institutions as the Ministry of Science and Education, UK, Trinity College (Cambridge), NSF, London School of Economics, Smithsonian Institute, Max-Planck Institute for History of Science, the Ford Foundation, the Lakatos Foundation, and the Institute for Advanced

Studies (Princeton).

Professor Cao has held academic positions at Trinity College of the University of Cambridge, Northwestern University, Harvard University, MIT, and Wolfson College of Oxford University. He has published or edited four books, authored 19 book chapters, 17 journal articles and book reviews; presented 54 invited lectures, and is working on five book-length monographs.

Cao's visit was co-sponsored by International Programs and Phi Beta Delta, Honor Society for International Scholars.
