LEADERS OF UNITED NEGRO COLLEGE FUND  
TO MEET IN RALEIGH, N.C. MARCH 12-14

The United Negro College Fund will hold its joint annual meeting of Members and Directors in Raleigh, N. C. from March 12-14th.

Arthur A. Fletcher, executive director of the UNCF, said that the meeting will continue the practice of holding board meetings in a city where the UNCF has member institutions.

Shaw University and Saint Augustine's College, two UNCF colleges, are located in Raleigh.

On the agenda for the leaders of the Fund to discuss are matters pertaining to the financial problems of the schools, possible new avenues of loan assistance to students and greater cooperative planning among the member schools.

The UNCF consists of 40 private fully-accredited four year institutions. Some 45,000 students attend these schools.

Ely R. Callaway, president of Burlington Industries, Inc., will be the main speaker at a corporate luncheon during the three-day meeting. The luncheon, which is by invitation only, will be held at 12:30 p.m. Monday, March 13th, at the Holiday Inn in Raleigh, where all sessions will take place.

John W. Winters, Raleigh real estate man and civic leader, will be chairman of the corporate luncheon.

Mr. Fletcher, who came to the UNCF from the Nixon Administration where he was Assistant Secretary of Labor and a member of the U.N. General Assembly Delegation, will make his first address to the Directors and Members at a dinner Monday night at Shaw University.

Another highlight of the meeting will be a reception honoring the 40 UNCF Presidents. This will take place at 4 p.m. Sunday, March 12th at Saint Augustine's College.

The United Negro College Fund, with national headquarters in New York City, raises operating revenues to assist its member schools. Last year, the Fund raised a record total of \$9.4-million. Since its inception in 1944, the UNCF has raised some \$120-million to help its predominantly black institutions.

Dr. Herman H. Long, president of Talladega College in Alabama, a UNCF school, is president of the Fund.

Morris B. Abram, New York attorney and former President of Brandeis University, is the UNCF's Chairman of the Board.

Cyrus R. Vance, former U.S. negotiator at the Paris Peace Talks, and also a New York attorney, is Chairman of the 1972 UNCF National Campaign.

Mr. Callaway, the corporate luncheon speaker, is a native Georgian who has been in the textile business for more than 25 years. He became president of Burlington Industries in 1968. Mr. Callaway has been Chairman of the UNCF's National Corporations Committee for two years, 1970 and 1971.

Mr. Winters, who will be chairman of the corporate luncheon, has served three 2-year terms on the Raleigh City Council and is a director or trustee of several Raleigh banks and business associations. He holds an honorary doctorate from Shaw University, where he is a trustee. He and his wife, the former Marie Montague, have eight children and five grandchildren.
